February Council Meeting Notes

After approval of the consent agenda, Rosabeth Ward led discussion on action item updates.

Preschool Committee – Kelly Walden reported that as of January, 2024, her \$500.00 monthly contribution toward expenses had been paid. Kristie and Kelly had review and discussion regarding preschool use of the copier, and it was proposed that the preschool pay an additional 50.00 a month for use of the church copier rather than obtain their own copier. A motion was made to accept this proposal which was seconded and approved.

Special Request – Kelly reported that Tammie Hogge is retiring after this year. The ability to provide health insurance benefits would make it easier to hire qualified candidates, and Kelly asked if she could add the teachers to the United Methodist Church health insurance policy. Rosabeth Ward will ask Stan Coloff to look into this request.

Grounds, Improvements & Cemetery Report – Johnny Fleet reported there was a water leak which he and John Groves have worked to repair and have the Middlesex Water Authority review.

Johnny explained that a request has been made to the District Superintendent for final approval of the separation of the cemetery from LUMC into a 501(c)13 LLC. Once this occurs, an account will be opened to deposit existing cemetery donations.

Board of Trustees – Johnny Fleet, chairman, reported that a State Corporation Commission annual registration filing fee is due for Lower Chapel, LLC, the Limited Liability Corporation established in 2023 for the possibility of disaffiliation. Johnny explained that since the LLC was not utilized for that, it was still available to LUMC to use as its LLC. A motion was made to move forward with the filing which was seconded and approved.

New Business: Rosabeth led discussion on how to move forward in ministry to reach others. Suggestions included:

1. Start Sunday School Again, 2. Seek Healing Spirit for Our Congregation, 3. Pray at the Alter with Others after Sunday Worship Service, 4. Survey New Members to Address their Needs, 5. Schedule Meals Outside of Church to Talk with Others – Share Helpful Connections and Form Friendships, 6. Bring Back Vacation Bible School.

Old Business: Reverand Tim Earnhardt will help Rosabeth in April to gather different groups. The goal is for each person to choose a statement and then join a committee to "live the mission".

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 8:15 p.m. The next Church Council meeting will be on Tuesday, March 5, 2024, at 7:00 p.m.

John 19:28-30 Jesus knew that by now everything had been completed; and in order to make the scripture come true, he said, "I am thirsty." A bowl was there, full of cheap wine; so a sponge was soaked in wine, put on a stalk of hyssop, and lifted up to his lips. Jesus drank the wine and said, "It is finished!" Then he bowed his head and died.

Matthew 27:51-52 Then the curtain in the Temple was torn from top to bottom. The earth shook, the rocks split apart. The graves broke open, and many of God's people who had died were raised to life.


Mark 16:9 After Jesus rose from death early on Sunday, he appeared first to Mary Magdelene from who he had driven out seven demons.

John 20:19-23 It was late that Sunday evening, and the disciples were gathered together behind locked doors, because they were afraid of the Jewish authorities. Then Jesus came and stood among them. "Peace be with you," he said. After saying this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy at seeing the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father sent me, so I send you." Then he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive people's sins, they are forgiven; if you do not

forgive them, they are not forgiven."

Acts 1:8-11 "But when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, you will be filled with power, and you will be witnesses for me in Jerusalem, in all of Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." After saying this, he was taken up to heaven as they watched him, and a cloud hid him from their sight. They still had their eyes fixed on the sky as he went away, when two men dressed in white suddenly stood beside them and said, "Galileans, why are you standing here looking up at the sky? This Jesus, who was taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way that you saw him go to heaven."

Romans 6:4-9 By our baptism, then, we were buried with him and shared his death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from death by the glorious power of the Father, so also, we might live a new life. For since we have become one with him in dying as he did, in the same way we shall be one with him by being raised to life as he was. And we know that our old being has been put to death with Christ on his cross, in order that the power of the sinful self might be destroyed, so that we should no longer be the slaves of sin. For when a person dies, he is set free from the power of sin. Since we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live



with him. For we know that Christ has been raised from death and will never die again-death will no longer rule over him.
